

## Actions to Implement the World Conference on Indigenous Peoples Outcome Document List of Supporting 94 Indigenous Governments and 22 Organizations

Current as of July 5, 2016

The Outcome Document of the UN World Conference on Indigenous Peoples contains important decisions that will improve the lives of indigenous peoples and governments, but only if properly implemented. The following list of indigenous governments, intergovernmental organizations, and organizations and coalitions support recommendations being advanced by the Indian Law Resource Center to implement commitments by the UN and member states at the World Conference concerning: the creation of a strong implementing and monitoring body for the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples; adoption of rules to enable the participation of indigenous peoples' governments at the UN; and actions to combat violence against indigenous women.
